Cardozo School of Law is honored to host the Association of American Law Schools' Section on Alternative Dispute Resolution's Seventh Annual Works-in-Progress (WIP) Conference for scholars, practitioners, and researchers in dispute resolution. The Conference will begin with a welcoming reception on the evening of Nov. 7, followed by an all-day session on Nov. 8 with a celebratory dinner in the evening, and a half-day session on Nov. 9 hosted by JAMS in the New York Times Building. On Saturday afternoon, the group will have optional excursions to the World Trade Center or the United Nations.

The WIP Conference is an invaluable opportunity for dispute resolution scholars to engage with one another's research. The WIP Conference welcomes both junior and senior faculty interested in furthering their research and writing in order to publish a current project. If you are interested in presenting at the WIP conference, please submit a proposal of approximately 600 words. If selected for inclusion, you have the option to submit a full draft of the paper before the conference, and junior faculty would be assigned an experienced faculty member in the field as a commenter. Participants will receive lively commentary and helpful input on their work.

The *Cardozo Journal of Conflict Resolution* would welcome submissions of papers selected for the conference for inclusion in the Journal.

Initial 600-word proposals should be submitted for consideration by May 27, 2013, to eic@cardozojcr.com. Authors will be notified of selection for inclusion by June 27.
