

## Assessment of Stone Soup Course Experience

### From the instructions:

**The person you interview could be one of the parties in an estate settlement (a child, spouse, or other relative for instance), an attorney who represented a party in the case, or an estate administrator or personal representative. A “significant” estate settlement is one that took a substantial amount of time. You will ask the subject to describe their experience with this estate settlement.**

7. Was the assignment required, one of several options, or for extra credit? **Extra Credit**
8. If students were to write a paper, how long was the paper supposed to be (in double-spaced pages)? **3-6 pages**
9. When was the assignment due (or when did you conduct a Stone Soup assignment)? **Nov 9, 2017**
10. What percentage of the grade was allocated to the assignment? **10 pts for paper, 5 pts for presentation**
11. Did you discuss in class the results of students’ work? If so, what did you and the students learn from this discussion? Was this a good use of class time?

**Students who wished to present could sign up for limited slots to discuss their findings and observations in the class. It was fascinating.**

12. What did students learn that they wouldn't have learned without the Stone Soup assignment or activity?

**How trusts & estates applies to actual people in every day life; that not EVERY estate ends up in a messy case book example but that is often because there was advanced planning; that what they are learning is actually applicable in everyday life and that the concepts they learn interact with many other areas; how to identify issues in estate planning that can become problematic if not addressed.**

13. What worked well with the assignment or activity? **The entire assignment.**

14. What would you do differently if you do it again? **I can't think of anything immediately.**

15. What would you advise other faculty considering using a Stone Soup assignment or activity?
